

Continue down South Main St. until you find a mountain range made from metal. Who are the artists? Do you know what flower covers the front of the sculpture?

CLUE #4
Dip into the town center. A picture is worth a thousand words, or a thousand *Reasons Why We Live in Yancey County*, a _____ by artist Barbara Webster in _____.

CLUE #5
Back outside, take a right and continue south to the corner of the town center. What animal is resting on a rock under the Do Not Block Intersection sign?

CLUE #6
Round the corner to the right, making your way to the other Town Center entrance. Find a mural in full bloom. Who painted this mural?

CLUE #7
Head back to S. Main, crossing the street. A large cement sculpture greets you on the corner. What is the title? In this piece by Martin Webster, do you think the title describes the sculpture?

CLUE #8
Make your way back to the town square, stop to explore the *Petals & Leaves* sculpture. These aren't our normal soft petals & leaves. What material did Ila R. Seltzer use?

CLUE #9
A hop, skip, and jump past *Petals & Leaves*, you'll find a balancing act! Carl Peverall titles this piece _____. Why do you think he did that?

Back at the square, follow the brick sidewalks toward W. Main St. Thirsty yet? Enjoy a refreshing _____. This mural was originally created by Janet Wickell and renovated by _____.

CLUE #11
Continue down the brick sidewalk, turning every once in a while, to notice the sides of the buildings. What building "doesn't allow dogs"? This mural is next to _____ and _____.

CLUE #12
Enjoy a sweet treat across the street and check out Toe River Arts Council's mural at 102 W. Main St. What kinds of art are depicted in this mural?

CLUE #13
Time to follow the yellow brick road back to the square. We are almost done! What color are the horses under the rainbow in this mural by Rhea Ormond?

CLUE #14
Wait! Don't cross the street yet. Follow the sidewalk to the left to a mural full of Hope. *Roundabout* was envisioned by _____ and created by Randall Honeycutt.
